He was a top class navigator/co-driver over many years, competing up to a few months before his death with Dave Higgs in his TR7 V8, but he will be better remembered for his drives with Will Onions in the Escort Mk2 and Gavin Cox who he sat with on 9 Rally GB events with some great results.

Tim originally worked in the banking sector, but lately was a supervisor for the Prince's Trust in Birmingham. He has been a huge part of BTRDA. He was the book keeper for, and a valuable member of the co-ordination team of the Forest Rally Championship and a committee member for many years. He was a Director of the Association and brought a calm but very amusing presence to our meetings. When not helping us, he was an active member of Telford MC and on his spare weekends was seen marshalling or stewarding on various events from night rallies to hillclimbs. I was very touched to see that the Rally North Wales organisers had named the famous Gartheiniog stage in Dovey in memory of Tim, he would have liked that.

Finally I would like to say a big thank you to Jane Evans and her team. She had a very successful start to the Protyre MSA Asphalt Championship on the Epynt Ranges with over 100 registrations so far, and its great to see so many of our friends back in all classes.

One point of interest was the live streaming which we did for the first time. We had over 120,000 viewers on the day, which is about 6 times more than our projected TV audience so we ask what future has TV coverage?

The BTRDA Luncheon 2018

It's perhaps the only time in the year when all 8 BTRDA championships get together and celebrate the successes in each of them. At the moment the Forest Rally Championship have their own dinner and awards night attracting a large number, as befits the championship with the largest number of entrants (267 in 2017). The Sporting Trial contenders have a grand final followed by a Dinner and evening activities local to the final - this year it was at the North Lakes Hotel & Spa in Cumbria that Ian Wright/Keil Wright celebrated their Gold Star. For the 2017 awards night the Rallycross championship entrants joined forces with the MDA (Minicross Drivers Association). So, that Allrounders. iust leaves the Autotest. AutoSOLO and Car Trial BTRDA awards to be handed out and this was the main part of the awards bit at the Drayton Manor Hotel on Sunday, 21st January.

Before then there had been the AGM of the British Trial & Rally Drivers Association Ltd where the annual accounts were looked at, nominations made for members on the BTRDA Council and BTRDA Ltd Directors and voted for. It was a short punchy meeting chaired by President Mike Broad who kept everything under control. The only thing he did not quite get right was the late arrival of the cookies!

Just a short time later Mike was saying Grace for the 89 members and guests seated for the luncheon, I have listed the numbers as 89, but some did not make it due to the unpleasant snowy conditions and ice around the country. Amongst the guests was David Richards CBE, the newly appointed Chairman of the MSA and it was pleasing to see him chatting to BTRDA member Colin Hilton who retired from Chief Executive of the MSA in 2013. Also present were the new MSA Asphalt Championship (run by BTRDA) organiser, Jane Evans who was seen getting plenty of encouragement from the newly elected chairman of the Forest Rally committee, Neil Cross.

The lunch was silver service 3 course with ample amounts to keep the stomach well filled. In between courses there was a chance for each table to complete Mike Sone's face recognition quiz. Names for the 20 pictures of the famous and not so famous caused much discussion with no table getting them all correct. Why is it we don't recognise minor government ministers? Whatever, the entry fees all went to the Air Ambulance. After coffee it was on to the awards with the splendid array of permanent trophies and glass replicas covering several tables and suitably arranged by Sue Underwood and her colleagues. First up were the winners of the BTRDA and MSA Car Trial championships awards presented by Mike Stephens, the Gold Star going to Shawn Franklin and the MSA title going to Rupert North. The Autotest awards were presented by chairman of the MSA Autotest committee, Mike Sones with words of explanation from Ann Cook. Richard Pinkney was the top winner here only just keeping ahead of the top 4 drivers to take the Gold Star. The AutoSOLO champion winners received their awards from BTRDA Council chairman Steve Layton, the major award here going to Jamie Yapp who used no less than 3 different cars during the year to score his points. John Rook showed some entertaining video of Rallycross action and Jeff Hope-Davies was represented with his Gold Star and trophy by Bill Skermer. The final set of awards for the BTRDA Allrounders Championship are what the late President Denis Flather used to call the top awards of the BTRDA and were presented by the top man at the MSA. David Richards CBE. John Wadsworth competed on no less than 50 events in 2017, not bad for an 80 year old! and was a well deserving winner of the Margot Young Trophy for 3rd overall. Richard Yapp picked up 2 awards with the Darbyshire Trophy for 2nd overall, and the Davijon Trophy for the best total using a single car (his Mazda MX5). The final Gold Star of the day and the Peter Cooper Trophy went to the overall winner John Fox. This concluded a well-run afternoon finishing on the time prescribed by Mike Broad. The presentations were made more entertaining by the wit of the presenters Nick Pollitt. Ann Cook and John Rook whilst John also operated the overhead projector of the pictures he had organised for all the award winners.

Will you be at Drayton Manor Hotel on the 27th January 2019 for the presentation of the awards and recognition of your achievements in 2018? See you there.

Jordan Road Surfacing **BTRDA®** Rally Series



THE BEAST FROM THE EAST...

For the second year running, the start of the Jordan Road Surfacing BTRDA Rally Series® has been disrupted by adverse weather conditions. Last year the Cambrian Rally was forced to call it a day shortly after getting under way and, this time, the organisers of the Malcolm Wilson Rally were faced with no option but to postpone their event after what became known as the 'Beast from the East' deposited large amounts of snow and ice across much of the UK in the days before everyone would have been setting out for M-Sport's HQ in Dovenby. With the blessing of the MSA, they were hopeful of securing an alternative date later in the season, but the non-availability of certain forests on their preferred October date eventually scuppered their plans. Our commiserations and thanks to all involved with the Malcolm Wilson Rally for all their hard work and we must now wait until March 2019 before the opportunity to sample the Lake District stages presents itself once more.

Following their experience last year, there'll have been a number of badly-bitten finger nails amongst the team from North Wales Car Club prior to the start of the Cambrian Rally. However, fate smiled on them this time and the event took place without а hitch. Notwithstanding an absence of four years (he was 3rd on his last appearance in 2014), Paul Bird returned to North Wales to take 2nd overall and, more importantly, maximum points on the opening round of the 2018 Jordan Road

Surfacing BTRDA Gold Star® Rally Championship. Unlike a number of his fellow competitors, the Cumbrian driver (no, not Cambrian, Cumbrian - he's from Penrith!), accompanied by Jack Morton, has kept the faith with his Focus WRC and, in spite if an incorrect tyre choice for the final couple of stages, the partnership came up trumps.

Undoubtedly, 2017 Gold Star Champions Stephen Petch/Michael Wilkinson would have liked to kick off the defence of their title with a win but, nevertheless, a solid run in their Fiesta WRC saw them take the final podium spot. 24s behind Bird, and a good haul of points to boot! Late entry Osian Pryce in his Mitsubishi Mirage was just 4s adrift of Petch by close of play, with Fiestas filling the next three places. Marking a return to the BTRDA Series, Julian Reynolds proved that he is still a potent force at this level - he and Patrick Walsh led former Cambrian winner Hugh Hunter, who had Manxman Rob Fagg along for the ride, and 2016 Gold Star Champion Charlie Payne and Ian Windress over the finish ramp in Llandudno, each setting off their new campaigns in fine style.

Dylan Davies/Llion Williams' Impreza took the B13 class win in 8th place, half a minute in front of the Escort Cosworth of Ian Joel/Graeme Wood, with the Top Ten being closed out by BTRDA Production Cup winners on the day, Russ Thompson/Andy Murphy.

In the case of Matt Edwards, his 'home' event (his dad is Clerk of the Course!) was definitely a

case of what might have been! He set FTD on the opening sevenmiler through Penmachno by a staggering 16s from Hunter but then in its haste, on the next stage, his Fiesta caught the end of a log which, in turn, broke a strut. Game over? Well, in terms of a good result, yes - but, in line with a new Blue Book regulation, once he'd sorted himself out, he was allowed to continue, albeit with major time penalties. So, having missed SS2/3, he went on to set fastest times on each of the final

four stages to come home in 74th

place out of the 75 finishers.....

Luke Francis/John H Roberts' move from their past Cambrian-winning Mitsubishi Lancer to a Fiesta WRC seemed to be going according to plan - they were lying 4th after SS4, but then everything went awry on the next when they removed a front wheel.... Even so, they fared somewhat better than Sacha Kakad/James Aldridge who had also joined the ranks of Fiesta owners for the new season but, unfortunately, their example suffered problems with its starter motor prior to the first stage and, consequently, was not to be used in anger...

There was a delay on the opening stage after Simon Rogers launched his Lancer EVO6 into the scenery at high speed - 'aerobatics' in his words, but he is full of apologies to those he held up and full of praise for those involved in extricating him and taking him to Rhyl Hospital for a check-up. He was released later that day and promises to be back when - quote - 'he and the Mustard Missile are a bit better'....

Following on from the close finish to last year's BTRDA Production Cup®, the new season has started in a similar vein with the top two finishers a mere handful of seconds apart after 45 miles of stages! The Lancer EVO9s of Russ Thompson/Andy Murphy and defending champions Pat Naylor/lan Lawrence were the major players, especially after a returning Tom Naughton, with Will Rogers, had been forced to throw in the towel when his own EVO9 succumbed to mechanical issues on the fifth of the seven stages.

Thompson was fully 15s quicker than Naylor through the opener and, increasing his

advantage by more modest amounts over the next few stages, inflicted damage to an extent that, even when Naylor hit back to take 11s out of his rival on the penultimate stage and a further four on the last one, the order still didn't change. Dan Moss/Sam Allen finished just outside the Top 20 to make it a Lancer 1-2-3 at this early stage in the proceedings, but all the signs are pointing to some exciting tussles the season as progresses....

There's a definite Welsh bias to the upper echelons of the Fiesta ST Trophy points table at this early stage of the contest! Zak Hughes (Welshpool)/Tom Wood (Cwmbran) took top honours first time out, ahead of James Giddings (Swansea)/Sion Cunniff (Gaerwen) and Kalvin Green (Treorchy)/Osian Owen (Rhyl). Of those not classified as finishers, the Tordoffs, Mathew & Tim, ended their day in a Stage 1 ditch, Brynmor Pierce took a wheel off his example on the next one, joining Martin Laverty/Phil Kenny who also didn't make SS3 and then Richard Wells ground to a halt with a broken driveshaft on SS5.

Using their local knowledge to good effect, the Rowlands brothers took centre stage in the battle for Jordan Road Surfacing Silver Star® Championship points. In spite of a lucky escape at one point (and posted on Youtube for all the world to see!), John Rowlands/Glenn Latham won the two-wheel drive category outright with 15th overall in their Escort, while Ieuan and Emyr Hall were three places and exactly half-a-minute down in Barry Jordan's Avenger BRM to take 3rd. However, what we didn't see coming was the 1400cc Talbot Sunbeam of Chris Powell/Jim Lewis finishing between the Blaenau Ffestiniog brothers! 17th overall and a class win by nearly four minutes should fill the Hereford pair full of confidence for their assault on the 1400 Championship title ...

Andy Davison/Tom Murphy are also pretty handy in their Talbot Sunbeam VXR, beating last year's Silver Star runners-up, Rob Dennis/Andy Boswell (Escort), by one place and

one second! Then Owen McMackin/Lee Taylor, in another Escort, made Class B12 all their own, ahead of the similar car of former Silver Star Champions Allan McDowall/Gavin Heseltine.

leuan Rowlands/Emyr Hall also took their loaned Avenger to top BTRDA Historic Cup® points, finishing ahead of Mr Jordan himself who, for his part and with some help from Paul Wakely, was next up in a Fiat 131 Abarth.

Among those who could have reasonably expected to feature in the results - but didn't! were Nick Dobson/Steve Pugh who were left deflated after their Escort suffered two punctures and carried only one spare, and Richard Sykes/Simon Taylor whose hopes of getting their Citroen DS3 R3T back to Llandudno were dashed by a visit to a ditch in Penmachno North.

Heralding the launch of the new BTRDA Rallye R2 Cup, nine drivers took up the challenge and, from them, the Fiestas of George Lepley/Tom Woodburn and Bob Vardy/Keaton Williams were first and second respectively. While George finished comfortably ahead of Bob, the third-placed Peugeot 208 of Jack Leese/Sam Spencer was a mere three seconds adrift.

Charlie Barlow/Emma Morrison continued the Fiesta dominance with 4th place, with likeminded Alex Waterman/Harry Thomas and Tony Simpson/Ian Bevan rounding off the Top Six.

There are two sides to every coin and, as such, both crews who failed to make the finish were also in Fiestas! Better luck next time to Jordan Reynolds, who had enlisted the services of 2016 Silver Star Champion Co-driver Caron Tomlinson for the event, and Roger Nevitt/Mike Smith....

Already credited above, Chris Powell/Jim Lewis were certainly punching above their weight on the Cambrian in their Talbot Sunbeam. Of course, Top Twenty finishes on BTRDA Series events in 1400cc cars are not unheard of - who can forget Julian Wilkes' fabulous 3rd overall on the snowy 2012 Wyedean in his Nova? However, with all due deference to Mr Wilkes, those were exceptional circumstances.... For Messrs Powell/Lewis, their mission - should they choose to accept it! - is to do everything within their power to maintain the Sunbeam's reliability. Last year, they started six rounds, from which the euphoria of a first and two seconds was muted by three retirements. Gentlemen, over to you.

Hefin Lloyd-Davies' Corsa was 2nd on the day, with Perry Gardner/Toby Brick (Nova) 3'^d. The Brick family - dad Dave and brothers Freddy & Toby - have been staunch supporters of the 1400s over the years and it's good to see Toby upholding family honour into 2018. Pete Gorst/Phil King took 4th-placed points in another Nova, whilst Tommi Meadows will be another eternally grateful that the event was running to the new Blue Book regulation that allowed him to rejoin after an earlier problem. OK - he was classified last finisher in his Ford Ka but, nevertheless, he left Llandudno with a reasonable points haul to take to his next event.

Sam & Liam Johnson emerged from the forests of North Wales to take victory on the opening round of this year's BTRDA Rally First® Championship. Their Seat Arosa finished ahead of the 2.0 litre VW Lupo of Matthew Baddelev/Shaun Hughes and the Nissan Micra of Owen McConochie/Rhodri Williams which. from looking at the results, you just feel had had one of those days it would rather forget. The same could probably be said for Richard Ingleby/Alex Booth who, having journeyed all the way up to Llandudno from Bridgwater and Hereford respectively with their MG ZR, suffered the indignity of retirement on SS3 with mechanical issues...

Next on the agenda is the Rallynuts Stages (aka Severn Valley!) as the Midland Manor MCorganised event rejoins the BTRDA Rally Series for the first time since 1989 and sees contenders making the first of two visits to the Royal Welsh Showground in Builth Wells.

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TIM HOBBS 1956 - 2017

It was with great sadness that just before Christmas last year, the BTRDA learned of the passing of one of its most popular members. Tim Hobbs.

Tim had been a member, and Treasurer, of the BTRDA Rally Committee since 2003 and more recently had become a member of the BTRDA Board. During this time the BTRDA was able to draw on his extensive knowledge and experience, and he made an invaluable contribution toward the success of the BTRDA Rally Series.

On leaving school he joined the banking profession, but subsequently moved on to become Enterprise Manager for The Princes Trust. He was able to call upon the skills he acquired and developed in these environments, to the benefit of the Association.

Tim was a popular and well known competitor, competing extensively for many years, having started in the early 1970s with his brother Phil. In 2009 he was BTRDA Silver Star Champion Codriver, sitting alongside Will Onions. He competed on thirteen WRGB/ RAC Rallies, and despite his ill health, he continued competing during 2017. He served as Chairman of the International Rally Drivers Club, but was just as happy as an organiser, or a marshal, and was always ready and willing to be involved on events in any capacity.

He was a quiet, unassuming individual, had enormous enthusiasm for motor sport, but was mischievously and dryly humorous about those who failed to meet his own high standards.

We and his many friends throughout motorsport remember him with great affection and miss him tremendously.

I have decided on four hill climb and sprint championships. My first is the Prescott B license Championship with 8 events in four locations - Prescott, Shelsley Walsh, Loton Park and MIRA. This is a handicap championship where you get a target time based on your previous times at that venue or your practice times on the day.

My second championship is the Cross Border Championship which is a Scottish run championship with hill climbs and sprints both in Scotland and Northern England. There are 22 events of which your best 9 are used to calculate the results. This is a great championship because you end up going to events you would never go to such as Forrestburn and Doune as well as many northern venues such as Harewood, Barbon and Blyton Park. You also meet a whole new crowd of competitors on the Scottish events plus travelling in Scotland is much easier than in England due to much less traffic.

My third hill climb and sprint championship is the Classic Margues Championship which is unusual as pre season your car is tested on a rolling road and also weighed including the driver and a complicated formula works out a factor. This factor is applied to your times on each event, the idea being that a standard Frogeye Sprite can compete with a fully sorted TVR Griffith. This championship is new to me this year so I will let you know how it works later in the season. There are 25 venues from a Goodwood Sprint to a sprint at Croft, with hill climbs at Harewood, Ty Groes, Prescott and Wiscombe with sprints at Lydden Hill and Castle Combe. Your best 8 events count towards your championship score.

My fourth hill climb and sprint championship is Longton & District Northern Championship which is a conventional championship based on class results. There are 21 events from Anglesey Circuit to hill climbs at Harewood, Barbon, and Olivers Mount and sprints at Aintree, Blyton Park. Your best 9 results qualify for the championship results.

If you just enter one championship you are automatically entered in all of the other championships such as stage rallies, historic rallies, sprints, hill climbs and car trials. I enter the car trial championship which covers Production Car Trials and then I am entered in the Sprint Championship and the Hill Climb Championship and the Allrounders. Unlike many championship you have to enter most of the events to do well in this championship. Though I plan to enter 9 of the 11 car trials I can only enter 8 of the 17 sprints events and 5 of the 9 hill climb events. This is mainly due to date clashes. However, the Allrounders is based on your 10 best events, a number which is achievable though this still favors those who enter more events. I cannot disagree with this ruling.

I will also enter around 4 of the BTRDA Autosolo championship events to try and get a reasonable score for the BTRDA Allrounders Championship

as I need just one good score for this championship. Last year I made the mistake of only entering two Autosolos. If I was good at this I would only need to enter one event but maybe more practice will help.

That is the plan for 2018, so hopefully with some good planning and preparation, sorting out the diary for the year and ensuring events are entered as early as possible. To keep track of this I use a paper spread sheet to document all the planned events, note the date the entry is posted, keep a copy, and date of confirmation of receipt and plan the accommodation, if required. This can be tricky as often one has to book hotels before the regs are issued. Entering 50 events a year- you need a system or better still a Secretary.

So I wish you all the best for the 2018 season and I look forward to seeing many of you during the year.

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BTRDA® Sporting Trials Championship

In spite of Sporting Trials being a winter sport it is surprising that long term we only seem to average around one cancellation due to weather per year. This year has been different, as although we are only one third of the way through our season we have lost three trials so far.

The BTRDA Gold and Silver Star Final was run in Cumbria in early January and it could have been weather affected but a canny choice of site and a bit of luck meant it worked really well, with 38 runners including 5 Irish visitors, after a very hard fought contest Ian Wright in his Sherpa Indy scored 40 to beat Northern Ireland's Brian Edgar by just two points. The Silver Star was won by Tom McKinney also from NI, with an outstanding result that placed him 12th overall.

There was a long pause in the calendar but sadly the next event, the Charles Pollard at Uppingham was cancelled in late February, then the snow came but surprisingly the Waslingham, run by 750MC, ran successfully in early March in Hampshire but understandably given the inclement weather, whilst it attracted 31 entries, only 16 brave souls turned up for the trial, of whom seven ran in the Club Class. Ian Wright followed up his stunning victory in the Gold Star with his Sherpa Indy a few weeks earlier with another one here, closely followed by Richard Sharp's Cartwright a few points adrift.

The following weekend in early March we had two events scheduled, both at Shelsley Walsh and we were very worried about the state of the ground after a lot of rain. The Saturday event was one of our Trials Training Days that we run each Spring and Autumn, and we attracted nine participants, one of whom did the Masterclass as he was a car owner, whilst the others were novices. We had four cars with instructors for them, and had a great day as proved by the appreciative emails received after the event. During the day the MAC Club who run Shelsley announced that the Blankstone Trial the following day was cancelled. Given the state of the ground this was undoubtedly the correct decision, after a few runs we were able to move the sections during the Training Day before the ground cutup too badly, something not possible at a proper trial. It was very damp as it was but I offered the participants the option to call it a day at lunch, which they unanimously rejected

and voted to carry on. As it happened we had an even better afternoon as the drizzle slowly retreated. One lovely coincidence on the training day was one couple from Cambridge met up with a local couple from Worcester at Shelsley and it turns out they were great friends some 35 years previously and had lost contact

The following weekend a "two header" was scheduled in Cumbria, the Butterfield on Saturday and the Stone Trough on Sunday. The Butterfield ran successfully with a small entry of 16 but the Stone Trough was cancelled due to weather. Richard Sharp's Cartwright took the honours from local driver Brian Walker who tied with Bob Packham, an outstanding result in his live axle Kincraft. The Northern Phoenix Club hope to re-run the cancelled Stone Trough later in the year, and to award the unique trophy which is a little trough carved from the local stone, on a wooden plinth.

The Presidents at Waterlooville in Hampshire followed a Historic Trial the previous day on the same site. By all accounts it was very wet indeed for the Historic on Saturday but it dried out considerably for the Presidents on Sunday, which attracted a reasonable entry of 26, including four in the Club Class, and conditions were ideal for the sections even if the small paddock was pretty gooey! Ian Wright was again the winner in his Sherpa Indy, with a decent margin on 23 marks but behind him there were loads of ties, two on 31, one on 32, two on 35, and three on 36, pity the poor scorer, who managed to produce the results very guickly so those like John Fack (2nd) and Roland Uglow (3rd) who both had to return to Cornwall, and Richard Sharp (4th) to York, were able to get home at a reasonable hour.

At the time of writing next weekend's Geoff Taylor Trial which is slated to be run at Church Stretton in the lee of the Long Mynd is subject to some doubt, as the Mynd was snow covered this morning, and lots of rain is forecast for the next couple of days, so fingers crossed!

All in all a pretty poor start to the season mainly due to weather, and entries have been at the lower end of the scale, we can only hope for better in the next few weeks before the summer break.

Maybe hope to see you on some of the drier hills? Julian Fack.

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"2018 Season Preview"

The 2018 Autosport International BTRDA Clubmans Rallycross Championship in partnership with Toyo Tires will be run over 9 rounds this year. The renewal of title sponsorship with Autosport International, in addition to major backing from other high profile sponsors, not only allows all events to be televised but also will mean the championship will have a presence at the Autosport International at the NEC in January 2019.

The Championship reached new heights in 2017 and 2018 will see even more additions with the increase to 9 rounds, the return for the first time since 2012 to the 'Home of Rallycross' Lydden Hill in September and a whole host of new drivers and cars.

With the reigning BTRDA Rallycross Champion and Gold Star winner Jeff Hope-Davies looking like he won't compete in a full championship in 2018 and the introduction for Production 4x4 and Junior drivers to win the overall championship then the overall trophy will definitely be going to a new home come October 27th at Croft.

Clubman 4x4

The headlining Clubman 4x4 category with their 450+ bhp, 4x4 cars, will have a 5 round championship at Pembrey and Croft in 2018. The 2017 Champion Roger Thomas will return to try and re-claim the category title, driving the ex Mark Flaherty Ford Focus. Four drivers following the Subaru theme are Gary Pusey, Nigel Burke, Simon Horton and Liam Manning who is moving up from the Production 4x4 category for 2018, all three are sure to be at the sharp end of competition. With other likely drivers set to include; Andy Grant (Focus), Mad Mark (Xzara), Imran Mogul (Mitsubishi), Mike Manning (Focus) and a host of Irish drivers set

to join the series at Pembey in May and July, the action is sure to be fast and furious.

Production 4x4

Introduced for the first time in 2016, this class is still attracting a lot of attention with grids expected to be between 6 and 10 cars this year. The category also see's major backing from 'Albatec Racing' Andy Scott's BRX, ERX, and WRX Rallycross team who want to give something back to grassroots motorsport. Reigning Production champion Paul Davis (Subaru) will start as favourite especially as he has been working hard with the R1 Motorsport team over the winter to increase power from the engine and handling of the car. Other driver who are expected to challenge for the title include Dan Beattie (Subaru), 16 year old Ross Connolly (Nissan Pulsar), Darren Clark (Nissan Pulsar), former Autocrosser (James Lyon) and the husband and wife team of Tracey Bennett and Stephen Spear (Subaru WRX). Rumours have it that other drivers will be joining the category throughout the 2018 season.

SuperModified

The Unique and diverse SuperModified category will certainly provide some of the best action in the Championship with some real headlining drivers & cars looking to take home the title. Returning to Rallycross in 2017 Mike Dresser (Lotus Exige) will be hoping winter developments and testing have cured all the issues surrounding reliability which hit the car last year. Also guaranteed to be at the sharp end of the results include; Tony Lynch (Ford KA) who is returning to the Championship in 2018 and Guy Corner (Peugeot 206) both of whom have the cars to win on the day. Other drivers who will be looking to challenge will include Paul Johnson (BMW M3) and Irishman Patrick Ryan (Nova) who has committed to a full



championship and will be joined by fellow countryman and 2014/15 BTRDA Champion Kieran Curran (Corsa) who will join the series at Pembrey. Toyota driver Marc Jones along with Fred Ling (Fiesta ST) and Nick Angrave (Honda) will also be pushing for top honours. There will also be some drivers returning to the championship in 2018 and these include; Gary Cook (Fiesta ST), Bob Hardie (Tigra), Bruce Bamber (Honda), Todd Crooks (BMW Mini), Rob Scott (Porsche) and Brian Jukes (Audi TT). Some new cars set to join the grid during the year include; Adam Mills in his new Mazda RX8, Danny Prime in a Toyota Starlet, Simon Cofield Ford Focus and Jaco Wassermann Ford Fiesta MK6.

Production

Going into the 2018 season, the Production category looks like it could be the most open it has been for years with Jeff Hope-Davies not doing a full season, Martin Peters selling his car and Graham Rumsey going circuit racing this opens up the category. An end of season win and some good form for Eddie Gibbs (Clio) could put him as favourite for the title if mechanic woes have now been sorted. Joe Meskauskas (C2) looks to be increasing pace and the likes of Lee Green (Saxo), top lady competitor Sue Lane (Honda). Luke Mason (106) will all be looking for top honours. There is also a whole host of new drivers, hire drivers and new cars joining the grid in 2018 including BTRDA Allrounders champion Jamie Yapp who will be hoping for some strong results. Former circuit racer Mac McArthy will be looking to put his experience to good use on the Rallycross circuits. A new car for Andrew Smith (Clio), new driver Nathan Jones (Civic) along with some top Polish drivers Dan Lukas, and Tomasz Chojnacki will all be pushing for strong results. A dark horse and certainly someone who is coming with the pure intention to claim the overall BTRDA Championship title, Irishman Keith Kerrshaawe will drive the ex John Ward Peugeot 106 GTi in all rounds this year.

<u>Classic</u>

The new name for 'Historic' in 2018, the Classic category is sure to provide some great racing

from some of the older machinery and often most flambovant drivers. With the uncertainty of when or if the 2017 Champion Brian Harman will join the grid, it is expected that Shaun Buckley (Escort), Mike Grant (Fiesta) and Ryan Stutchbury (205), David Ewin (Fiesta EVO), will be the ones setting the pace in the category. Other drivers who will be looking to get in on the mix include; Nick Potter (106), Richard Todd (BMW E30), Vince Bristow (BMW), Carl Skitt (Calibra) and Rallycross newbie Leigh Marsh in his Rwd Ford Escort Cosworth. There are some new drivers and cars set to join in during the year these include Aaron Pullen (MR2), Ryan Taylor (BMW E30) and former 2000cc Production champion Mark Finch who will drive a very unique BDA powered Ford Fiesta Mk3.

Juniors

The 2017 season saw the Junior category grow to their biggest ever BTRDA grids and with it some really great racing from the 14 to 16 year olds. A great mix of diverse machinery adds to exciting racing and in 2018, the category is set to grow even further with an expected 10-12 cars expected to contest all rounds. The reigning 2017 Champion Tom Constantine is back for a full season and is aiming to challenge for overall BTRDA Championship honours not iust Junior trophies. With uncertainty around whether Jaidon Bennett will race this year. it could be family members James Constantine and making his debut in 2018 Luke Constantine to challenge Tom for the title. Two girls will join the Championship with former Autcross driver Amy Baines (Corsa) and the daughter of SuperModified driver Guy Corner, Eleanor Corner (Swift) will both be looking to beat the boys at events. If you also add into the mix the likes of regular podium driver Morgan Wroot (Swift), Cameron Hawks (Saxo), Rallycross newbie, Matilda Procter (Swift), son of Supercar driver Roger Thomas, Archie Thomas (Swift), and 2 former Autograssers Jamie Lewthewaite (205) and Rogerio Mendes (106) it really looks like it will be a fantastic season. Another driver who is looking to join the Championship later in the series is Jayson Riddle (Clio).

The 2018 Autosoport International show, 11-14 Jan, was the first outing this season for the BTRDA Rallycross Championship. We had 4 cars in attendance, each representing different categories within the championship and

including drivers for the new Production up to 1400cc class. Following the show we have seen entries for round 1 and championship registrations reach new heights. The results of the show could not have been achieved without the support of the following drivers and their teams; Ryan Stutchbury with his 205 GTI by R1 Motorsport, Paul Davis with his Subaru Impreza also by R1 Motorsport, Fred Ling with his Ford Fiesta and Ross and Mark Connolly with their Extreme 22 Peugeot 106.



Blyton Park BTRDA Rallycross Round 1 March 25th

Some would say that the BTRDA Rallycross Championship falling on the weekend of the 24th/25th of March was very lucky, with freezing temperatures and snow the week prior and with snow and cold temperatures forecast for the following weekend, we thank ourselves lucky for a bright, sunny and warm day that presented itself for Round 1.

Some 57 drivers entered for the first round of the 2018 Championship, many of whom were not only new to Blyton but also to the sport of Rallycross proving that the championship is

certainly 'grassroots' and also providing the main entry level to Rallycross in the UK.

Production 4x4;

The **Albatec Racing** Production 4x4 category attracted 4 cars in the first round and it was Dan Beattie who took all 3 heat wins with fastest times. Paul Davis had a scary moment in heat one when brake failure caused him to stop after lap one. When final time came and it was pole man Dan Beattie (Subaru) who drove a lights to flag victory, winning by just over 3 seconds from the fast charging Paul Davis (Subaru) and a further 3 seconds behind Ross Connolly driving his very unique Nissan Pulsar GTi-R. The final car over the line was Tracey Bennett making her Rallycross debut increasing in speed as the day went on and is now planning a full assault on the BTRDA Championship.

SuperModified

The fast and furious **AS Performance** SuperModified category certainly didn't disappoint with the racing being as close as ever. A great entry of 12 cars lined up for round 1 with 2 drivers sharing the spoils during the 3



heats with Tony Lynch (Ford KA) taking 2 fastest times and Welshman Marc Jones (Toyota MR2) taking the other heat win. A few drivers had dramas throughout the day with Porsche driver Rob Scott failing to set a time with clutch problems, Mike Boak fuel leak, Phil Chicken broken steering, Fred Ling damaged suspension and Irishman Patrick Ryan having both a throttle jamming open and a broken driveshaft causing him major problems during the heats. Dave Brown (Puma) saved his own drama up for the prize giving, having been very pleased with his new car all day, he missed his Class award announcement and very nearly went home empty handed.

Once the heats were over it was finals time, first up was the B final at it was Irishman Patrick Rvan who drove a lights to flag victory, behind him John Cross and Mike Dresser had a great 5 lap battle with each of them having individual issues with their cars. Still, Mike came out on top and joined Patrick on the back row of the A Final. Starting on pole for the A Final Tony Lynch drove away from the pack and took a great win from the recovering Patrick Ryan and in 3rd place Marc Jones in his Toyota who was chased all the way to the flag by Phil Chicken (C2).

Production

The biggest entry at Blyton was the Mel Williams Tyres Production sponsored category where 25 cars lined up on the grid.

Eddie Gibbs – Renault Clio 172

Some new names appeared at the event and didn't disappoint and the entry was boosted by BTRDA Allrounders Champion Jamie Yapp returning to Rallycross for the first time since 2015 and former BRX, ERX and BTRDA competitor and journalist Hal Ridge having a one off drive in a hire car. The racing during the heats really was fierce with 3 different drivers taking a heat win; Eddie Gibbs (Clio), Irishman Keith Kerrshaawe (106 GTi) and top lady driver Sue Lane (Honda) having her best rallycross event to date which saw her start from the front row of the A Final along-side Eddie. That was a "significant birthday" present to herself which fell just 2 days later. Two drivers who didn't fare so well at Blyton included BTRDA debutant Mark Henry who has a crank sensor fail on his car and Lee Keller who rolled his Saxo in the D Final. With a huge entry the finals went all the way down to a D Final which saw Jonny Christ (KA) and Elliot Lewthwaite (205) move forward onto the back of the C Final. The C Final saw a great race between 3 drivers; Peter Hamlett (306), Tomasz Kozon (Saxo) and Thomas Edmundes (MG) which saw them covered by less than 1 second at the flag, but it was Peter and Tomasz who went forward to the B Final. In the B Final it was front row starter Andrew Smith (Clio) who drove a lights to flag victory. behind him Jamie Yapp (106) and Dan Lukas (106) who had an extremely close battle, bumper to bumper and at the flag it was Jamie who claimed 2nd place and joined Andrew in the

A Final winning by only 1 hundredth of a second. The A final saw a great race and it was pole man Eddie Gibbs who drove away and claimed only his second ever category victory. Behind him things were significantly closer with Tomasz Choinacki (Saxo). Sue Lane and Irish man Keith Kerrshaawe covered by less than 2 seconds at the flag. Dale Ford (Saxo) came home 4th, closely followed by Hal Ridge (C2) and Jamie Yapp.



<u>Classic</u>

In the Steve Gaunt Trailers Classic category numbers were a little thin on the ground at round 1 and it was regular Shaun Buckley in his MK2 Escort who won all 3 heats. started from pole and then also won the A Final. Behind Shaun the racing was very close with Rallycross newbie Ryan Taylor (BMW), former production driver Richard Todd (BMW) and Leigh Marsh (Escort) all exchanging and paintwork places throughout the event. Former 2000cc Production champion



Mark Finch had no luck at the event with a head gasket failure in heat 1 which saw his Fiesta go no further. The two classic Mini drivers Craig Truelove and the flamboyant lan Clark put in some great racing and certainly mixed it with the bigger, more powerful machinery. In the A Final a fantastic battle for second place saw Ryan Taylor take the position at the flag but only just ahead of Richard Todd, Ryan Stutchbury (205) and Leigh Marsh, with these 4 drivers covered by 2 seconds at the flag. Ian Clark was the best of the Classic Mini's coming home in 6th place ahead of Craig Truelove.

<u>Juniors</u>

In the HT Installations Junior Category 8 drivers lined up at the event, 5 of whom were complete newbies to the championship which is a great success story. During the heats it was the Constantine family trio who dominated the times with Luke, Tom and James each taking a heat win. They didn't always have it their own way and were often challenged for top 3 position finishes by Morgan Wroot. Amongst some of the newbies were 2 brand new girl racers, Eleanor Corner (Swift) and Amy Baines (Corsa) who had some brilliant battles throughout the day. Both having competed in Autograss Jamie Lewthwaite (205) and Rogerio Mendes (106) enjoyed their first Rallycross event and found more and more pace throughout the day. Once the heats were over it was BTRDA and Blyton debutant and only in

his 2nd every rallycross event Luke Constantine (Swift) who put his car on pole position and lead the pack away as the light turned to green. The next 5 laps would see an amazing battle between 4 cars which would see them all cross the line within 2 seconds of each other. As the flag dropped it was Luke who took his first every Rallycross win and with it the BTRDA Best Newcomer of the day award. He was closely followed home by Morgan Wroot (Swift), James Constantine (Swift) and the 2017 BTRDA Junior champion Tom Constantine (Swift). Behind this gaggle of 4 cars it was Eleanor Corner who really did come to form in the A final, coming home in 4th place, closely followed by fellow girl racer Amy Baines and rallycross newbies Jamie Lewthwaite and Rogerio Mendes who stalled on the line and spent the next 5 laps chasing the pack down. Meanwhile while these 8 lucky drivers were having great fun for the day in very good weather, Jaidon Bennett's absence was down to an appointment with an important exam, hope to see you later in the year Jaidon.

All in all this was a great start to the 2018 Autosport International BTRDA Clubmans Rallycross Championship in partnership with Toyo Tires, some great racing, debut drives and some new names at the top of the order.

2018 could see the most openly fought championship ever, attentions now turn to rounds 2 and 3 of the Championship which take place on May 12th/13th at Pembrey Circuit in South Wales.





- We are pleased to be able to say that significant sponsorship has been sought and found over the winter months which will see 8 out of the 9 rounds televised with only the round 3 event on May 12th at Pembrey not covered due to the un-availability of a production crew. Television production company 247.TV will continue to film in 2018.
- The 2018 Championship will be televised on at least 3 channels with; Motorsport.TV, Premier Sports and Front Runner all confirmed for this year. By the time the first airing is broadcast is it also expected that Freeview channel 'Freesports' will also show the coverage in addition to the dedicated BTRDA Rallycross 'Youtube' channel.
- Autosport International has returned as the title sponsor for 2018 making it 5 years in a row, in addition to the continued deals with Toyo Tires and renewal of sponsorship from Mel Williams Tyres and Steve Gaunt Trailer Hire. Some new names will appear for 2018 with 'Power Maxed' and 'Steel Seal', 'Racebredauctions' and 'AS Performance' becoming Associate sponsors and 'HT Installations' and 'Albatec Racing' becoming new Category sponsors.
- The BTRDA Rallycross Championship will be once again present at the Autosport International Show on 12/13th January 2019.
- The new for 2018 Production 1400 category made its debut at Blyton, with one sole entry for Elliot Lewthwaite, sharing the same car his bother used in the Junior category. More drivers and cars are set to join in as the season progresses.
- Great news for the Production 4x4 and Junior category drivers in 2018 as they will now score points towards the overall BTRDA Championship.
- With the continued support from Toyo Tires in 2018 the Tire incentive for drivers will continue for all drivers who win their respective A Finals whilst also using 4 Toyo Tires on their car. They will receive a £150 incentive payment.
- A whole host of new drivers are expected to appear in the 2018 Championship in which it is hoped that the number of registered drivers tops the 100 mark for the very first time.

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
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Protyre MSA Asphalt Rally Championship

Evans leads Protyre MSA Asphalt Rally Championship after thrilling victory on the opening Tour of Epynt

Melvyn Evans won the opening round of the 2018 Protyre MSA Asphalt Rally Championship, the Port Talbot MC-organised Melvyn Evans Motorsport Tour of Epynt (11 March), in his Subaru Impreza WRC S12b.

It has been two years since the 53-year old Lampeter driver had driven the car, and six years since he last rallied it on Epynt, yet he and co-driver Mark Glennerster were quickly into their stride. The key to their success was a big push over the infamous Burma Road – a very tricky and technical section where bravery and precision can reap its rewards. And so it proved, as Evans inched ahead of the opposition to win the 74 stage mile event by 39 seconds.

Damian Cole had set equal fastest time with Evans on the opening two stages in his Get Connected Ford Fiesta WRC, despite ripping the handbrake out of the floor! Co-driven by Jamie Edwards, the six-time MSA Asphalt Rally Champion never put a foot wrong in the damp and greasy conditions and got his Championship assault off to a great start with a very strong run to second.

Jason Pritchard spun his North Road Garage Ford Fiesta S2000 at the first junction on the opening stage, losing a few precious seconds at the Llandeilo'r Fân Triangle, before continuing through the very damp first loop of stages with understeer. Despite very little seat time in the car, and the S2000 being considerably less powerful than the World Rally Cars around him, Pritchard and co-driver Phil Clarke set a remarkable pace – even setting fastest time on the seventh and final stage when the rain returned – to finish an excellent third overall.

Last year's Tour of Epynt winner and number one seed Bob Fowden was going well in his Comline Auto Parts/NGK-backed Subaru Impreza WRC S11. Co-driven by Aled Davies, he was third (only 16 seconds behind Evans and five seconds behind Cole) when he slipped off the road on a particularly greasy corner near the end of SS5. Beached, he was unable to get back onto the road.

A late change of car saw Steve Simpson/Patrick Walsh contest the event in a CA1 Sport Fiesta RS, and an excellent run saw them finish fourth. Adrian Spencer/Matt Daniels lost time with early gearshift issues, a spin on SS1, an off onto the grass on SS3 and a big moment on the approach to Four Ways Bridge on SS4. They recovered and closed the gap to Simpson to just 13 seconds by the end of the final stage, with the Subaru Impreza crew coming home fifth to bag a good set of Championship points.

Wayne Sisson/Max Freeman won their class and finished an impressive seventh overall in their immaculate Mitsubishi Evo. Less fortunate were Evo drivers Philip Turner/Simon Anthony







Protyre MSA Asphalt Rally Championship

Huw Reed/Anthony Hackett hit their pre-event target of finishing as top two-wheel drive Championship contenders, which was no mean feat in the damp and greasy conditions in their 2.5-litre Millington Series 2-engined Darrian T90 GTR. Tony Rees/Geraint Thomas finished 15th in their similar car, it what was only their second ever rally in it. The throttle jammed open on two stages, but they survived the slippery conditions to get their season off to a fine Championship points-scoring start.

Phil Turner/Ian Meakin were top Championship Escort Mk2 contenders home with a magnificent 11th place finish – ahead of Richard Slinger/Phil Sandham, who were doing only their third rally in their Mk2. It was the first time on Epynt for the highly experienced Steve Retchless and, together with Sasha Heriot, he recorded a good finish – as did Paul and Julian Doroszczuk in their immaculately home-built normallyaspirated Cosworth-engined Escort Mk2.

On their first rally for nine months, Mike Williams/Ken Bills finished a magnificent 12th in their MG ZR 160, Tom Barber/Jaime Barber won the battle of the BMWs, coming home 16th in a Compact, while Double N4 class champions Chris Rice/Craig Cameron scored a top 20 finish in their Subaru Impreza. Geoff Wright/Chris Sanderson last contested the Asphalt Rally Championship in a Group N Nissan Almera, so they did well to survive the hazards of Epynt to record a finish upon their return to the series in a Fiesta S2000. John Macniven/Alex Kermode spun their Subaru Impreza on SS5, but their Epynt debut was rewarded with a good finish. In his 20th year of contesting the Asphalt Rally Championship, Geoff Glover got his season off to a points-scoring start in his rear-wheel drive Astra. Co-driven by Keith Barker, Glover had to take it fairly easy, however, as he hadn't had time to shakedown the brand new engine before the rally started. It was also a successful pointsscoring mission for Gareth James/Ryan Jones in their Peugeot 205GTI.

Edd Fossey's journey from Jersey was rewarded with a Championship class win in his new Peugeot 208 R2, the 19-year old reigning BTRDA 1400 Champion quickly getting used to the car with Chris Sharpe-Simkiss on the notes. They finished ahead of Roger Priestnall/Jamie Forrest (Proton Satria S16) and Darren Pool/Christopher Beer (Vauxhall Corsa). Mark Booth/Pauline Merrills reached the finish in their Honda Civic, despite spinning off the road on SS2 and getting stuck for three minutes and then losing two minutes with a misfire on SS3/4.

Bill Paynter/Andy Hollingham took Championship honours in the 1400 class in their Peugeot 106 Rallye. Oliver Bell/Sam Johnson retired their Nissan Micra on the opening stage, Lloyd Morgan/Marc Clatworthy were forced to retire their Nissan Micra when a HT lead snapped before SS4 and Rhidian Daniels/Tomos Whittle also failed to finish in their Citroen C1 Max. Will Mains/Sion Jones were leading their class by almost four minutes when their rapid Vauxhall Nova stopped with alternator failure after SS6.



Damian Cole/Jamie Edwards Photo: RallyGallery.com Nigel Feeney/Sean Donnelly were worried about a vibration in their Mini John Cooper Works Mini WRC before the start - and their fears were correct when clutch failure put them out after SS2. The Spencer Sport Mitsubishi Mirage R5 of Jamie Jukes/James Morgan was inside the top 10 before they were forced out after a big moment on SS2, while the sister car of Philip Hopkins/Aled Edwards was battling for sixth when they went off the road and retired on the final stage.

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Protyre MSA Asphalt Rally Championship

Melvyn Evans (1st overall): "It's been six years since I last drove this Subaru Impreza WRC on Epynt - we were car number three on the Tour of Epynt in 2012 and won, and this year we were car number three and we won again, so we'll have to be car number three more often! We started off sensibly to see what our pace was like - the pace was there, so we had a push on the Burma Road on the middle loop and found that was the place we could take a bit of time out of Damian. There are lots of fast places on Epynt where it's very difficult to make any time, so we were really fast and precise in the tricky sections and that's what made the difference and paid dividends. All the drivers have gone well today. It's been slippery and greasy, tyre choice has been very difficult, but it's been a fantastic battle all the way to the finish."

Damian Cole (2nd overall): "It's always nice to win, but I've only won the Tour of Epynt once before and lost count of the times I've been second here and it's bridesmaid again today! I said before the start that Melvyn was the one to watch and he's proved the case and has been very fast all day. We matched him on the first two stages, but then he put his foot down a little bit and pulled away from us. We went quite well. We may have had the wrong tyres on for one loop, but apart from that everything went well and the car was good. We're looking forward to the Isle of Man now. I've been third there three times and second once - so we'll be trying on the Manx to score the one podium result that's so far eluded us."

Jason Pritchard (3rd overall): "I haven't driven the Fiesta S2000 very much at all, and every mile in the car we do we're improving. The car hasn't got the grunt of a World Rally Car, and on the long uphill sections of the New Road, and accelerating out of tight junctions, we were obviously losing a bit of time. But we were fastest in the rain on the final stage so, had it been wet throughout the day, maybe we could have been a bit closer to challenging for the win. We'll use the Focus WRC on the Isle of Man – we've won the event three times in a row and last year we set fastest time on every stage bar one in the car, so we're already looking forward to round two."

The Tour of Epynt was broadcast live on the Special Stage Facebook page, with well in excess of 100,000 views for the web streaming service. The footage, with commentary from Howard Davies, will remain on-line for viewing. Details regarding the transmission times for the television programmes will be issued on the Asphalt Rally Championship website and Facebook page.

It was a successful event for Protyre Motorsport, which took over 1,100 Pirelli, Michelin, Hoosier and Hankook motorsport tyres to the event – with almost every registered Championship competitor taking advantage of the tyre selection and fitting service in the changeable weather conditions.

Round 2 of the Protyre MSA Asphalt Rally Championship is the Bet on Aces Manx National Rally (May 11-12).

The Hagley & DLCC (winners of the Denis Flather Shield for best event in 2017) Jon MacKenzie Autotests at Curborough was their first event in a very nicely prepared red Nova which I had the pleasure of scrutineering. I also then had the pleasure of watching Jack throw the Nova around the difficult tests to finish 4th in Class B, out of 8, and take the Novice award. As a parent, it's sad to report that dad Stephen came a poor second to son Jack on the day! There was another father/son combination for

the third newcomer where Elis Matthews drove a road going Nova in Class E. This time is was dad Lee Matthews who has the far greater experience of top class auotesting and he finished ahead of Elis at Curborough. Lee had in fact entered the event in an autotest style Class B Nova but with no gearbox drove the road going car in that class. Lee wondered why the car wasn't going too well on the first test and then at the end of the test found out the handbrake had been on! Cue the penny over the button and tape to hold it in place! Lee went on to finish 3rd in Class B in the road going Nova which just goes to show that the class of the driver always shows through. At the other end of the age bracket from Jack and Elis, John Waller has registered for the first time whilst

It was almost warm at Curborough for the Hagley event where over the years the weather has ranged from snow and ice to hot sun. I reckon this year it was right in the middle! Whilst the cars may have been freshly painted and prepared it took the first round of tests for the drivers to get into full auotesting mode as Malcolm Livingston (Lindsay Special), Alastair Moffatt (Mini Special) and Richard Pinkney (Caterham 7) all picked up 5 second penalties. One driver who didn't get beyond the second test was Chris Chapman in the new bright green Striker which decided that reverse gear shouldn't be in the gearbox but outside it. The Nova of Warren & Kelsey Gillespie lasted longer but suffered some problems under the bonnet in the afternoon and ended up back on the trailer and back up to Scotland. Malcolm, Alastair and Richard all stayed clear of penalties over the reaming 12 tests and it was a very pleased Malcolm who took the Harry Yapp Trophy for FTD by 11.4 secs in a total of 889.1 secs. Richard was only a further 3.3 secs behind Alastair whilst 4th overall was the first saloon driver Dave Mosey (Mini) who is determined not to lose out on tie breaks in 2018. Fastest test times of the day were shared between Malcolm

No doubt the shell is not so flexible now!) Best of the large class of Novas was Mark Thornton with a well deserved second place award going to Murray Walker. I wonder if this is Mark's first BTRDA class win as he now heads both the Silver and Bronze Star tables? In the sports car class it was John Moffatt (Westfield) who picked up the second in class award with the energetically driven Striker of Stephen Morten not too far behind.

ľve mentioned above about Richard Pin33kney's Caterham 7 rebuild which was well documented on Facebook and caused quite a bit of merriment seeing the pile of scrap metal after everything had been put back into shape for the chassis. The excess metal would have provided Steptoe with a good income! It got me thinking about the difficulty we would have if we ever went down the Sporting Trial route and had a series of event for "classic" autotest cars. How much of the original should remain for it to fall within the class? Perhaps the oldest autotest car I know of and saw compete back in the late

1960's was the Doug Worgan DHW special with registration number KO 20. The car then went through several owners and ended up with Nevil Smith in East Anglia. Nevil made quite a few changes back in the 1980's by adding 6 inches to the body length so he could get into it. He also added an lsd removing the original fiddle brakes which was a feature of how Doug used to drive it straight line flat out to cone, fiddle on and round, flat out to next manoeuvre. This was a car that Trevor Smith would have liked to get his hands on. One car currently being rebuilt is the 9 time



winning BTRDA title car home built by David Haigh with a Datsun engine and gearbox. Owner Paul Fobister has stripped it down completely and changed the chassis to put in a Toyota 4A-GE engine and drive train. Not sure what the final layout will look like as it has yet to surface from the Fobby garage. Then there was the first John Last Special (layout similar to the ABS as used by Duncan Wild now) where Peter Jackson completely rebuilt it with different suspension.



Perhaps I could go on with almost every car used in the past. So, are there any totally original cars left from the last 50 years of Autotesting? One I do know of is the Frogeye sprite of Denis Beare with its number plate WOV4 which his son Stuart (now chairman of the BTRDA Sporting Trials committee) still has and did try a bit of a restoration project on it a few years ago. Not sure where that ended up! Then the one car which disappeared from the

competition scene was Morris Bishop's Mobi One which became very well-known last year when somebody put the original Pathe News article on Facebook showing its amazing turning capability staying very close to a pretty lady using the 4 wheel steering. I believe it was the first 4 wheel steering car to be built and also had a unique feature at that time (late 60's) of using LPG fuel. A short bit of the Pathe News feature was also shown on the BBC TV entertainment programme "Have I got News for You" illustrating a U turn being taken by the Government. So, where is the car now? Anybody know?

If you fall into the first category, apologies for the difficulties our online membership may have presented to you – our f.o.c. concession is causing some technical and operational difficulties.

Try as I might, I can't avoid bringing the weather into this column. I'm sure you will be aware that our planned big season-opening weekend in the Somerset/Dorset/Devon borders area was totally "snowed off" and so at copy date we have no events under our belt to report upon. *Stop Press:* we've managed to prise in the report on the Golden Springs – thank you editor Pat!

We have reminded organising clubs that we are making Scrutineer Record cards available, the purpose of which is to record any advisory faults with cars and encourage their rectification. "Faults" might be relatively trivial, they might be marginal eligibility concerns; the list could go on!

We'd also like to consult on: whether to re-introduce a rolling date for Class 1 eligibility; or perhaps introduce a new Class for "newish" cars, in line with the original thinking behind Class 1. Please email me with your thoughts.

Don't forget the opportunity to spend a noncompetitive day at the MGCC "Taster 2" day at Bromsgrove on 29th April. New car, modified car, new techniques, novice driver – can all be "trialled" without prejudicing championship points. It's also a good time to spend in the company of like-minded folk to share ideas or see the assembled expert drivers put their skills to the test, with or without an explanation if things didn't go according to plan!

Golden Springs Car Trial – Woolbridge Motor Club – 25 March 2018

I think by now it has been well documented that the planned opening events to our 2018 Championship succumbed to the "wintery" weather that hit most parts of the country late February, into early March – and beyond. As a consequence, we lost the running of a new event in the championship (Windwhistle MC's Spring Trial) as the venue remained unusable 3 weeks later, but Woolbridge MC were more fortunate and with the persistence of Mark

Hoppe and his team their trial was able to run on 25 March. We are indebted to the club for their efforts and look forward to returning to the venue in October, where we will conclude our year with the championship Final Trial.

Having been greeted at the entrance gate and then cleared scrutineering, competitors were presented with a generous welcome pack at signingon, including a useful score card sized clip board. The club was out to impress! We didn't even need to wait for the drivers' briefing to know our start hills (there were 3) as this had been advised in the Final

Instructions. The national trial had attracted 17 starters, the club trial 14, making for a rewarding turnout for the organisers. Conditions under foot were soft and damp, but Mark was generous, often very generous, with the width of sections and this minimised any loss of grass to the slippery mud that was poised to come to the surface at any time. Then, right on cue, nature's feel good factor emerged from behind the clouds to make for a thoroughly pleasant day and an unforeseen al fresco lunch.

I had the dubious benefit of leading off class 2 on one of the split start hills and knew I had to make the right choice of line and gain as much pace as I could whenever I could, for it was clear that with the odd exception I needed to maintain grip and not expect to dig myself out of trouble with incessant wheel spin; indeed, we'd been warned off this at the briefing. After a confidence building couple of sections with no points dropped, I neared the top of section number 5 heading for what, at a distance, seemed a difficult but possible 3rd zero. But having successfully crested a ridge I was horrified to see a finish gate out of reach to my right: the left hand stick I had been focussing on turned out to be the 2, not the 1. Lesson learnt. Move on.

Hill six involved a sweeping uphill r/h turn followed by a tighter l/h turn; I managed the first turn, somehow, but couldn't carry enough speed into the next turn, resulting in a score of 5. The good news was that this was matched by Shawn Franklin (Saxo) and nearly by Garry Preston (Uno diesel) on 6, but all other scores were in the 12 to 10 bracket, with Andy Webb (Alpha Romeo 145) pinching a 9. The conditions just seemed to be suiting the AX. Section 1 was

particularly different from the others, with a severe downhill drop off the line going into a tighter than 90 degree turn across camber, then down and up to the finish over a crest. The big decision concerned how one left the start line – over to the left where there was more grip downhill, but making for a tighter turn, or straight down from the r/h stick onto mud and loose bracken but with some grip thereafter for a better line to turn back up. I opted for the latter, knowing I had to keep off the brakes as far as possible before finding grip but the decision gave me a wider line and greater pace on the cross camber climb. Another pleasing clean, always the best reward for making a decision and then making it work.

After what seemed to be a longish round, with a bit of queuing when we met up with the other splits and having to move to and fro between fields, I finished the round on a lowly 6 but with Shawn pushing me hard on 7. Next best in class were a returning Garry Preston and Andy Webb both on 18; sadly Garry had to retire the Uno with a broken water pump. I was delighted that the half hour of preparation of the car at the end of February seemed to be paying off. Preparation? Oh yes! - I had swapped the front wheels from one side to the other. And washed the car.

Over in Class 1, the unexpectedly small entry (3) was devoid of Saxos and found Trevor Moffatt (Corsa) on 19 with John Wadsworth very much in touch on 22, leaving Bristol's Andy Wood (Yaris) on a more distant 49. In Class 3, we welcomed young Ifan Roberts (Dutton) and Dick Glossop (Liege) to our championship, with Dick showing his experience by tucking himself just one point behind Barrie Parker (Westfield). Intriguingly their scores couldn't match the best fwd Class 2 cars.

For the other 3 rounds, sensible tweaks were made between rounds 1 and 2 and between 3 and 4, with and necessary big changes being made over lunch. The scores at half time found Trevor just keeping ahead of John, Shawn falling back a tad and Rupert North (borrowed

Saxo) moving up to 3rd whilst at the close John had had a disappointing afternoon and slipped back a bit and status quo remained in Classes 2 and 3.

We are indebted to the landowner for permitting use of the venue after the difficult weather conditions (that made for a super trials surface), to Mark and Merv for their persistence and who, together with the marshals, made for a warm and welcoming day and a first class event. We'll see you in October.

If the event is run on a new date, any competitor who does not enter the 'new' event retains their 'Start' from the old date. A competitor who does take part on the new date will lose their 'Start', but score points in the normal way. These 'starts' can be accrued up to a maximum of twice in the year.

The championship scores are on the BTRDA website – and they are usually updated by noon the day after an event. They are also displayed at most events – the ones I go to anyway! Alternatively, I can e-mail you a copy if so desired; contact details are inside the front cover of this News.

HONORARY MEMBERS FOR LIFE

DEREK SMITH: Joined the BTRDA in 1951, competing regularly, particularly in Autotests, and won the Flather Star in1963. After three years as Secretary of the Autotest Committee he became General Secretary of the Association from 1967-1982 and was also Treasurer during the same period. As Chairman of the Rallycross Committee from 1976 to 1978, and a Group 1 RAC Timekeeper, he did much to improve the standards of timekeeping at BTRDA Rallycross and Autocross events

PHIL and JANET DARBYSHIRE: Phil and Janet have been actively associated with the BTRDA since the 1960's, and both served on the Autotest Committee and since the Mid. 70's on the Allrounders Committee. Phil is still a member of Council and has served on the Rallycross committee since 1984. Additionally they have been involved in the production of the BTRDA News

BRIAN and MARGARET STAPLETON: Though almost exclusively with Sporting Trials Committee, Brian and Margaret have also served the Association since 1974 with Brian acting as Committee Secretary and Margaret as a co-ordinator for the Sporting Trials Dinner. Both continue to take an active interest in the BTRDA.

MIKE and HAZEL STEPHENS: Mike has been involved in BTRDA activities for over 40 years, primarily concerned with the Production Car Trial committee and was its champion many times over, but also as secretary to the Rallies committee during the period of greatest development of both road and special stage championships. Chairmanship of the Association was taken up in 1982, and only relinquished in 1988 to the more demanding role of General Secretary until 2004. Hazel has been in charge of the organisation of the AGM and Awards Presentation day from 1988 until 2013, and between them, their household has looked after the distribution and posting of News and Clear Round since the early 1980's. They continue to be involved with various activities of the Association.

HOWARD WILCOCK: Howard joined the BTRDA Rally Committee in 1979 and has been involved with the BTRDA Rally Championships since 1987, firstly with the Clubmans Championship, and subsequently the Gold Star Championship, as Championship Co-ordinator. Throughout this period, his wholehearted commitment has been unstinting, his judgement and decisions taken about the format of the championship as a whole have been crystal clear, resulting in the Gold Star Championship being the pinnacle of clubman motorsport. He continues to be involved in the championship, and represents BTRDA on a number of MSA Committees

BRIAN MIDGLEY: Brian has been involved with BTRDA for over 40 years, principally associated with the production car trial world where he was committee chairman, and fierce competitor, for many of those years, whilst he was also responsible for the Association's awards for almost a decade. A constant and authoritative member of Council, he became a director of the Association upon its conversion to a Limited Company, and was subsequently elected as President in 1989. His tenure of that position saw the Association make great strides forward, both in its dealings with the MSA and in the motorsport world at large. His was the greatest contribution in the re-organisation of the Association into Holding, and Operational, companies that exist today.

MIKE SONES: Mike joined BTRDA in 1972 specifically to contest the Production Car Trial Championship, and moved on to the Autotest Championship in 1974. Having been rallying since 1963, he joined the Rallies Committee in 1977 and ran the Road Rally Championship until it's conclusion in 1987. Membership of the Allrounders/NEWS Committee began in the mid '70s, and the organisation of the AGM and Luncheon followed the retirement of Ron Kemp in the mid '80s. He was elected Treasurer in 1982 and served in that role until 1993. The Autotest Committee was joined in 1994. a membership that continues to this day. The Sporting Trials Championship was contested for a few years in the late '90s. In addition, he chairs the Rallycross Committee and is involved in the formation of the Holding and Operational companies that exist today, and in organising the 60th and 75th Anniversary celebrations. He was elected Chairman of Council in the Golden Jubilee Year of 1988 and continued in that position until retiring in 2014.

BERNARD BAKER: Bernard joined the Autotest Committee, representing event organisers, when Eastern Counties MC won the best event award for their Felixstowe round in 1977. He subsequently became committee secretary in 1980, a role he finally relinquished in 1997. His accountancy skills also brought him to the attention of BTRDA Council, when he was asked to take the role of Treasurer during 1994, a position subsequently confirmed at the AGM in 1995. He continued in the role until the end of 2014, having successfully reported on the financial affairs of both the Holding and Operational companies for 20 years.
